- 7. What are the five traits given by the author that shows he is talking about a child of God (6:4-5)?
- 8. What happens to some brethren that shows the importance of pressing on to maturity (6:6)?
- 9. What illustration from agriculture does the author use to describe the spiritual state of apostate brethren (6:7-8)?
- 10. What four admonitions are given to the brethren in 6:9-12?

- Digging Deeper
- 1. What does "perfection" (KJV) mean in 6:1?
- 2. Why is it "impossible" for these apostates to repent (6:6; see also 3:12 and 10:26)?
- 3. Where is the OT reference that speaks of God swearing by himself in promise to Abraham (6:13-14)? How long in years did Abraham have to patiently wait and endure before God's promises to him were fulfilled (6:15; Gen. 12:4; 21:5; 22:16-17)?
- Applications for Today
- 1. Brethren who become "dull of hearing" need to grow and press on to maturity through study, application, and the teaching of God's word (5:11 6:1; 1 Pet. 2:1-2; 2 Pet. 1:5-8).
- 2. Spiritually immature and inexperienced brethren who will not grow in the knowledge and application of God's word are "babes" (5:13; 1 Cor. 3:1; Eph. 4:14). Mature, full-grown brethren are knowledgeable and discerning (5:14; Eph. 4:13).
- 3. The Bible does <u>not</u> teach "once saved always saved". Christians can and do fall away (6:4-6; Gal. 5:4).
- 4. Christians need to <u>show</u> their work and love in service toward their brethren (6:10; 1 Thess. 1:3; 1 Jn. 3:17-18)
- 5. Christians need to imitate those who patiently (steadfastly) endure to the end in order to receive the promise of heaven (6:12,15; Rom. 5:3-5; 1 Thess. 1:4; James 1:3-4).
- 6. Christians can hope in God's promises because God does not lie (6:18; Tit. 1:2).
- 7. The Christian's hope is like an anchor of the soul, anchored in heaven (6:19-20; Rom. 8:25).
