- 6. What happens to the people (3:12)?
- 7. Who does the Lord stand against in judgment and why does he stand against them (3:13-15)?
- 8. How are the "daughters of Zion" described (3:16)?
- 9. What does the Lord do to the "daughters of Zion" (3:17-24)?
- 10. What happens to the men, and the women who want to marry them (3:25 4:1)?
- 11. How are the remnant of Israel described (4:2-3)?

- 12. What does the Lord wash away and purge in Jerusalem and what does he use to do it (4:4)?
- 13. What does the Lord create over mount Zion (4:5-6)?

Digging Deeper

- 1. What was the sin of Sodom (3:9)?
- 2. Where else in the book of Isaiah is there reference to a "branch" and who does it refer to (4:2)?
- 3. What occasion did the Lord lead Israel with a cloud by day and a fire by night (4:5)?

Applications

- 1. When we persist in our sin against the Lord, he removes from us all that is good for us (3:1-7; Mt. 25:28).
- 2. The basic problem with man is that he is in rebellion to the Lord. His speech and his actions are against the Lord (3:8; Tit. 1:16).
- 3. Some people are proud of their sin and practice it in the open. They "declare their sin as Sodom, they hide it not" (3:9; 2 Pet. 2:13).
- 4. You reap what you sow, whether you are righteous or wicked. Each one will be rewarded according to his deeds (3:10; Eccl. 8:12-13; Rom. 14:12; 2 Cor. 5:10; Gal. 6:7-9).
- 5. We are not to neglect the poor (3:13-15; Gal. 2:10).
- 6. The Lord will judge proud, wealthy, and materialistic people who have sin in their lives (3:16-24; Rev. 3:17-19).
- 7. Over-dressing in order to bring attention to one's self is just as immodest as underdressing to bring attention to one's self (3:16-24; 1 Tim. 2:9-10; 1 Pet. 3:3-4).

- 8. The inward, spiritual beauty of holiness is more valuable to the Lord than outward physical beauty (4:2-3; Prov. 31:30).
- 9. The Lord wants to wash away the filth of sin in a person's life (4:4; Ac. 22:16).
- 10. The Lord protects his people (4:5; Isa. 31:5; Rom. 8:31; Heb. 13:5-6; 2 Tim. 4:18; 1 Jn. 5:18).
