- 8. What nation does Isaiah speak judgment against (21:13)?
- 9. How are the people of this place described and how long does it take for their glory to fail (21:14-17)?
- 10. What nation does Isaiah speak judgment against (22:1; see 22:4, 8-10)?

- 11. How are the people of Judah and Jerusalem described (22:2-3)?
- 12. How does Isaiah describe his feelings concerning the coming judgment upon the Lord's people (22:4)?
- 13. What happens to Jerusalem in the coming day of judgment (22:5-11)?
- 14. What is the attitude of the people concerning their coming judgment (22:12-14)?
- 15. What does the Lord do to Shebna and why (22:15-19)?
- 16. Who replaces Shebna and how is he described (22:20-25)?
- 17. What nation does Isaiah speak judgment against and how do others feel about their destruction (23:1-7)?

Digging Deeper

1. Why is Babylon described as the wilderness or "desert of the sea" (21:1)? What can be learned from Jeremiah 50-51 about Babylon's destruction?

- 2. Who were the Medes and when did they come to Babylon and conquer it (21:2)? Where in the Bible is this event recorded and where else in the Bible do we read about the Medes?
- 3. What can be learned from Jeremiah 49, Ezekiel 25, and Amos 1 about Edom's destruction?
- 4. What can be learned from Ezekiel 26-28 and Amos 1 about Tyre's destruction?
- 5. Where are nations of Elam and Media located on a map (21:2; compare with 13:17)? Where are Dumah and Seir located on a map (21:11) and where are Arabia, Tema, Dedan, and Kedar located (21:13-17)?
- 6. Why are Judah and Jerusalem described as "the valley of vision" (22:1, 5)?
- 7. Where are the words "Fallen, fallen is Babylon" found in the NT and who does it apply to there (21:9).
- 8. Where in the NT is wording similar to Isaiah 22:13 and 22:22 found?
- 9. Who is the king in Judah at the time of Shebna and Hilkiah and what other place in the book of Isaiah are these two men mentioned (22:15, 20)?
- 10. Where are Tyre, Sidon, Tarshish, and Kittim located on a map (23:1-2, 4, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 17)? What OT prophet attempted to flee to Tarshish?
- 11. What is "the Shihor" mentioned in Isaiah 23:3 (see Josh. 13:3)?

Applications for Today

- 1. We need to be hurt and horrified concerning the Lord's coming judgment (21:3-4; 22:4; Isa. 15:5; 16:9-11; Lk. 19:41; Heb. 10:31; 12:29).
- 2. People are often happy in their life of sin but they do not consider their coming judgment day (22:2; Lk. 17:26-32).
- 3. When people are punished by the Lord, they need to turn to the Lord (22:11; Isa. 5:12; 9:13; Jer. 5:3; Hos. 7:10; Heb. 12:5-13).
- 4. We do not need to have a frivolous and care-free attitude toward our sin or the Lord's coming judgment on our sin (22:13; 1 Cor. 15:32; Jas. 4:9).
- 5. Don't spend more time on preparing for your burial than on preparing for your afterlife (22:16; Lk. 16:19-31).
