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For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh, for the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh, but divinely powerful for the destruction of fortresses.

- 2 Corinthians 10:3-4 -

"But he knows the way that I take; When he has tried me, I will come forth as gold" - Job 23:10 -

The Old Testament character named Job was a real man. He was a family man, a wealthy man, an honorable man, a marked man, and a married man (Job 1-2). Job is described as a righteous man in Ezekiel 14:19-20 and a patient man in James 5:10-11.

This man named Job who had a great character was tested by God and Satan. He was allowed to suffer greatly, but in the end he remained faithful to God and he was rewarded (Job 42). Job described his trials and testing as being tried as gold (Job 23:10).

In Bible times, ore would be heated in a fire to separate the precious metals (like gold) from the slag or waste. This process was called "smelting". Let's see what it meant for Job to be tried as gold. Let's ask ourselves: "Am I being tried and tested and will I come forth as gold?"

Job was tested greatly. He was deprived of his possessions (1:13-17). He was deprived of his children who died (1:18-19). He was deprived of his

health with boils from head to toe (2:7-8; 7:3-5; 16:16; 19:20; 30:17,30). He was deprived of his wife who suggested he curse God (2:9). He was deprived of his inner well-being with emotional distress (2:13; 3:24-26; 7:13-16; 30:17). Job was deprived of his friends who falsely accused him (13:4; 16:1; 19:19). Finally, he as deprived of his social standing in the community as one of the important leaders (29-30).



Job was also deprived of his proper understanding of God. He never lost his faith in God, but he did question God and accuse God of some things. He said:

God is shooting at me (6:4) God is harassing me (7:11-12) God is unjustly inflicting me (9:17) God is killing me (13:24) God is hiding from me (13:24) God is hurting me (16:7-14; 19:8ff) Why was Job so successful during his time of suffering? Why did he come forth as gold? First, Job had built his life on God <u>before</u> his testing and trials came. He was a faithful worshipper of God for himself and his family <u>before</u> the problems came (1:1,5,20-22; 2:10).

Second, Job was a man of great moral character (31:1ff).

Third, Job looked beyond this life to the next - the resurrection day (14:14; 19:25-29).

Fourth, Job was willing to listen to God and be corrected (38-41).

Fifth, Job had a dogged determination to trust in God and do what God said (42:1-17).

Job was not the only one who was tried and came forth as gold. There were others. For example, faithful Israelites were tried and they were found to be as gold (Dan. 11:35; Zech. 13:9; Mal. 3:3). The Lord's church was also tried and the faithful will come forth as gold (James 1:2-12; 1 Peter 1:6-7).

Friend, how will you be found after being tried and tested? As gold?
