# THE WARFIELD BULLETIN

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For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh, for the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh, but divinely powerful for the destruction of fortresses.

- 2 Corinthians 10:3-4 -

We live in a world where many people want to exert their "individual rights". They want to "do their own thing". They do not want to be told what to do by the boss (during the week), the preacher (on the weekend), the parent or spouse (at home), the teacher (at school), the policeman (in town), the neighbor (next door), etc.

This approach to life leads to an attitude of liberty without any restraints. People with this attitude get used to doing what they think or feel. Like the false teachers of Peter's day, many today want to "promise liberty" so they can live as they want (2 Peter 2:19). However, we need to get back to the right approach to life which is found in the words of Mary, Jesus' mother: "Whatever he says to you, do it."

The setting of Mary's words is found in the occasion in which Jesus was invited to attend a wedding feast in Cana of Galilee (John 2:I-II). When the wine that was being served at the feast ran out, Mary said to the servants who were present, "Whatever he says to you, do it." Mary told the servants that they needed to listen to Jesus.

Jesus' glorious power and authority was displayed on this occasion in what he did and in what he said. He told the

servants to fill the pots with water and he turned the water into wine! So, Mary's words are important: "Whatever he says to you, do it." Let's look at these words closer. What right did Mary have to make this claim about her son?

#### WHATEVER HE SAYS...

First, note the emphasis on the word "he". Mary knew that Jesus was the divine Son of God. She knew that the baby in her was from God (Luke 1:31ff). Jesus was not just a man. He was God in the flesh (John 1:1, 14; Mt. 16:13-17) and he demonstrated his deity through his miracles. For example, the resurrection declared him to be the Son of God (Romans 1:4). Jesus must be heard because he is the divine Son of God (Matthew 7:21ff; 17:5; Acts 9:5) and it is through Jesus that God speaks to us today (Hebrews 1:1-3).

Today, many have forgotten, or have never learned, the need for divine authority in religion. We must all have authority from Jesus in religion before we can act in the name of religion. We must obey the words of Jesus (Luke 6:46; John 3:36; 13;14; 15:14; Colossians 3;17; Hebrew 5:9). We must have authority in a matter first, before we act (1 Chronicles 15:13).

Second, note the emphasis on the word "says". Mary wanted the servants to do what Jesus said. Jesus expresses his authority in what he <u>says</u>, not in his silence. Many today want to go by what the Bible does not say, rather than by what it does say. Remember, that which God does not speak about is not authorized (Leviticus 10:1-2; Jeremiah 7:31; 19:5; 32:35).

Third, note the emphasis on the word "whatever". Mary wanted the servants to do whatever Jesus said. We must observe <u>all</u> that Jesus commands (Matthew 28:20). We must do whatever Jesus says whether we understand it or not and we must do whatever Jesus says whether we like it or not.

### WHATEVER HE SAYS, <u>DO IT</u>

Finally, note the emphasis on the words "do it". Mary wanted the servants to actually do what Jesus said. We can either submit to what Jesus says and do it (like Samuel, I Samuel 3:10; or, Mary, Luke I:38), or we can be stubborn and refuse (like Saul, I Samuel 15:22-23). The choice is ours: submission or stubbornness (John I2:48). Let's all live by Mary's words: "Whatever he says to you, do it." - Chris Reeves
