- 4. What can you learn about Paul's vow and the shaving of his head (18:18; see also 21:24)?
- 5. Where in 1 Thessalonians and 1 Corinthians did Paul write about his stay in Corinth (18:1-11)?
- 6. What two epistles of Paul may have been written while he was in Corinth (18:1-11)?

Applications for Today

- 1. When a person rejects the only way to be saved, his blood is on his own head, and he is responsible for his own loss (18:6; Ezek. 18:13; 33:4, 6, 8).
- 2. When people you are speaking to reject the truth of the gospel, go find others who will accept the truth (18:6; Acts 13:46).

- 3. Pray for boldness to speak to people who don't want the truth (18:9-11; 2 Cor. 3:12; 7:4).
- 4. Hearing the gospel, believing, and being baptized leads to salvation (18:8; Mk. 16:15-16).
- 5. When some people don't have the truth on their side they often resort to false accusations and even violence (18:12-17; 1 Thess. 2:14-16).
- 6. When you make a vow (a promise), keep it (18:18; Eccl. 5:4-5).
- 7. It is good to establish disciples and ground them in the faith (18:23; Lk. 22:32; Col. 2:7).
- 8. Let us all be "fervent in spirit" while sharing the word of God with others (18:24-25; Rom. 12:11).
- 9. Let us be accurate in our understanding and presentation of God's word (18:26; 2 Tim. 2:15; 2 Pet. 3:16).
- 10. You help brethren when you publically defend truth and denounce error (18:27-28; Jude 3).
