• Questions

1. How might the gospel have come to Rome and when might Paul have written the epistle to the saints at Rome (1:1-7)?
2. What was Paul's future plan concerning the saints at Rome (1:8-15)?
3. What is the theme of the book of Romans (1:16-17)?
4. What condition, what judgment, and what need does Paul demonstrate concerning all mankind (1:18 – 3:20)?
5. What is the divine plan or means that God will use to save all mankind (3:21 – 5:21)?
6. The Christian is dead to (free from) what two things and alive unto whom (6:1 – 7:25)?
7. How does Paul describe the Christian's life in the Spirit with reference to the flesh and to suffering (8:1-39)?
8. What part of Israel would be saved by God and why (9:1 – 10:21)? What part of Israel would be rejected by God and why (9:1 – 10:21)?
9. How would all Jews and Gentiles be saved by God (11:1-36)?

10. After Paul taught about the WAY of SALVATION / RIGHTEOUSNESS (Romans 1-11), he taught about the WALK of SERVICE / RESPONSIBILITY (Romans 12-16). What responsibilities do Christians have toward the following:

God and the world (12:1-2)?

Local church membership (12:3-8)?

All Christian brethren (12:9-16)?

Evil men (12:17-21)?

Civil authorities (13:1-7)?

One's neighbor (13:8-10)?

Works of darkness (13:11-14)?

Christian brethren with personal scruples (14:1 – 15:13)?

11. What was Paul's future plan concerning Jerusalem, Spain, and Rome (15:14-33)?

12. Who, in general, are commended and greeted by Paul at the end of this epistle and why are they commended (16:1-16)?

13. What is the Christian's responsibility toward false teaching and false teachers (16:17-20)?

14. How does Paul begin and end his epistle to the Romans (1:1,5 and 16:25-26)?
